British Mandate 100 *Pathway For Peace*

The modern State of Israel inherited its contested legal foundations and territorial status from the **British Mandate for Palestine** (1923–1948), approved in London by the League of Nations a century ago this year.

In peace negotiations after World War One, the indigenous inhabitants of the defeated Turkish Ottoman empire were recognised for the first time, and the victorious allied powers 'mandated' to prepare them for independent self-rule – a progressive idea. One such ancient population was **the Jewish people**, always present in small numbers in their only ancestral land, but at the time increasingly returning after 18 centuries of exile.

Those at this luncheon will hear from experts in international law, history, and geopolitics, as well as vivid first-hand accounts of the British Mandate and its impact on the Jewish people. Although much has happened since then, perhaps truly **the past is key to peace in the present.**
